




WELSH INTERNATIONALS - Our new Internationals Board

Art and Design - Key Stage 3







Year 7 Art and Design students spent last term developing their painting and colour mixing skills to create a colour wheel and landscape painting, of the local area.

The class showed great confidence when working with watercolour and acrylic paint to mix their own colours.

This term students are moving on to work with traditional printmaking techniques. They are focused on creating lino stamps which will be printed on to reusable shopping bags and used in the local area.

The end of year Art and Design exhibition took place at the end of June and the work looked fantastic.



Project Wellbeing is a new and exciting mental health scheme conducted by a team of Year 12 students to support younger years with their concerns. As a team, we believe that it's vital for younger students to have an older peer mentor within school that will provide them with a safe and uplifting space to discuss their current situation and feelings. We began talking in assemblies to all students about how they can support their own mental health and seek support in school. I am really pleased with the team of Year 12s who have volunteered to become 'Wellbeing Ambassadors'. We had such a great day being trained in safeguarding, active listening and confidentiality by the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families. We also furthered our skills working with Cardiff and Vale Primary Mental Health Service. We cannot wait to initiate the project and provide pupils with the extra support and attention they deserve! It is so rewarding to have full support from the current school wellbeing system. Pupils are able to create a more positive and understanding environment regarding mental health within school.

Student Council

The Student Council of Llantwit Major School has completed many tasks over the academic school year. When a pupil raised an issue, the Student Council did not fail to try and come up with a solution. One of the projects the council focused on was charities. Each term, a subcommittee would organise an event to support those in need. The student council decided that the three causes they would choose to give to were The Vale Food Bank, Mind, and The Llantwit Major School Eco Committee and Nature Project. Another project the pupils decided to focus on was the Welsh language around the school. Videos on pronunciation and common words and phrases were sent out to parents to allow them to be able to speak Welsh at home. The students joining the school in 2022/2023 will sit a different curriculum to the current pupils. So, the group chosen to focus on this project, spoke to certain pupils from local primary schools about how the school will change by the time they become students themselves. Project period was a proposal to offer free feminine hygiene products to students. An article was written on its success in The Glamorgan Star. Single use plastic was an issue raised, so a group of students decided to create a Llantwit Major School reusable bottle. It was launched on Sports Day, and is available to purchase via Parent Pay. Safequarding, Bullying and Well-being was another Project the School Council worked on. The subcommittee created mental health support cards to go to the wellbeing centre, first aid, reception and the heads of years and created a video about how to support anti-bullying. It was played to all students in collaboration with the drama department. Overall, The student council have solved many problems raised, and found solutions and ways to deal with issues.

Our A level physicists continue to impress with their level of commitment to learning and pushing the boundaries of their perceived ability and potential. 7 of our Year 12 pupils took on the incredibly difficult challenge of sitting the British Physics Olympiad exam...and all 7 of them passed!

This is a huge achievement and we are extremely proud of their achievements.

Congratulations to Molly, Rosie, Sajan and Henry who have all been successful in securing Nuffield Research Placements over the summer months. These placements are very difficult to get on to and so it is testimony to our pupils that this year we have had a 100% success rate for the applications.

Molly will be undertaking research in the field of environmental science. Sajan in Computational Chemistry Software measuring the energetics of adsorption. Rosie will be tracking cell orientation in 3D models of cancer spread and Henry will be gazing at the stars whilst undertaking his research in the field of Astrophysics.

English Language 09:30-12:30 or Welsh language 13:30 - 16:30.

This is an interactive, online event led by GPs to help you get into Medical School and is aimed at pupils in Year 11 and 12.



Former Llantwit Major School pupil Morgan Edwards shares some very exciting news about his new role as a Detector Development Physicist at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory working on neutron detectors for ESS. I applied to STFC (the Scientific Technological Facilities Council) to work on particle detectors at their current neutron/muon spallation source in Oxfordshire. At ISIS they perform research using beams of neutrons or muons to look at the inner structure of matter in a non-destructive way. Using high energy neutrons is much better than x-rays when exploring lighter nuclei like hydrogen which is useful for exploring organic matter. Think massive microscope for looking at atomic spacing of materials (and a massive particle accelerator in the back to smash protons into tungsten to produce the neutrons). They have a project working on a brand new neutron detector that will be shipped to ESS (the European Spallation Source), which is a brand new state of the art 600 metre particle accelerator powered spallation source doing what ISIS does but 100x better. It's kind of a big deal in material physics right now that will come online in the coming years. I will be part of the team in the cleanrooms actually assembling, calibrating and testing this detector at ISIS with the goal of shipping it to Sweden at the end of the year. Not only will I be making sure they work but my report at the end will become the user guide for this instrument for the lucky physicists at ESS. This is one of the biggest impacts I can have in my field as an undergraduate placement student and it's above and beyond anything I thought I would ever get. I still can't quite believe how lucky I have been but I have the feeling that the opportunities afforded to me by SEREN and Mrs Denscombe's glowing references have got me here (along side my hard work and excellent grades of course!). This placement will set me up well for a career in physics and I'm excited to get started!

I first heard about the American
Programme when I started my GCSEs in
2019 and I knew almost immediately that
it was something that I wanted to apply
for when the time came. I watched as
older students in the sixth form took part
in similar programmes going on to study
at top US universities such as Yale and
Princeton, envying their success and
wishing I was in their shoes.

Coming back into the sixth form after the pandemic hit I chose to study chemistry, maths, further maths and sociology with ambitions to pursue a career in engineering. I keenly waited for the US programme to open up to my year group and in December 2021 I started my application process, competing with 2,000 other Year 12 students across the country for one of only 150 places.

The application process consisted of short essays and a video of myself explaining why I should be considered for the programme, as well as an extracurricular list and my academic achievements. I submitted my application in mid January and waited a long 2 months for my application outcome. Finally, on the 3rd March 2022 I received my acceptance email and couldn't have been happier!

Throughout the beginning of the programme I have had multiple different assignments and prep helping me begin to build a profile to put forward to US universities in the upcoming year. I attended a week-long residential at the University of Nottingham and along with the rest of the cohort I learnt about student life in America, the application process for American Universities, as well as prep for sitting my ACT exam. This took a huge leap of confidence as I travelled alone and surrounded myself with people I didn't know, although it was reassuring knowing we were all the same age and in the same boat. Since then I have juggled revision for the ACT with revision for my AS and A level exams, sitting the ACT in early June. I have just finished a second online residential with the programme over the last weekend where we explored what it takes to write an effective college essay, different types of American universities and spoke to students from previous cohorts. I am due to attend a third residential at the University of Roehampton in London next month. This is the replacement residential for the week in America with the programme exploring American Universities in person which was sadly cancelled due to COVID-19, but I am still extremely excited to be exploring my future prospects further and meeting with Admission Officers from America.


Although I still have a lot of work to do and essays to write, I can not emphasise enough the opportunities this programme has provided for me and I will continue to advise as many future Year 12 students, particularly those interested in a career in STEM to apply for this truly eye-opening opportunity.

Once again this year the science department was extremely lucky to be chosen to work with the MIT Global Teaching Labs.

Unfortunately due to covid restrictions our instructor was unable to visit the school in person to deliver face-to-face lessons. None-the-less our Year 9 pupils were delighted to be given the chance to discuss questions such as: `Is water wet?', `What came first the chicken or the egg?' And; `Are you the same person you were 10 years ago?`

Our Year 12 scientists were then treated to live steamed sessions focussing on the philosophy of physics and trying to work out if time travel really is possible.







Year 9 scientists continue to go from strength to strength exploring various aspects of STEM through enquiry based learning.

Some of their favourite lessons this year have included investigating whether the density of seawater affects the mass a cargo ship can carry, whether the shape and size of a wind turbine blades affects its power output and how do engineers and architects design buildings that are able to withstand earthquakes.

They have also worked incredibly hard utilising their numeracy skills to design and build scaled models of the National Grid.

Good luck to all of our Year 9 and Year 11 pupils who have worked hard on their applications for the STEMHaus summer school. Hopefully we will have some successful pupils who can share their experiences with you all in the next newsletter.





I wonder how many babies have been baptised at this particular font? We learned that the font is placed at the entrance to the church as a symbol of welcome to the family of the church. The font contains water that has been blessed by Fr Edwin. Near the font is a tall candle called the paschal candle. It will be lit during Baptisms and the candle that will be given to the parents / god parents will be lit from this paschal candle as a symbol of the family receiving the light of Jesus into their lives.

We are very grateful to Fr Edwin for his time and patience. Our pupils had a lot of great questions for Fr Edwin. Again, we are very grateful to Fr Edwin and his team for their support during the academic year.

School Lockdown Procedures

It is vital that staff and pupils are aware of procedures that will keep them safe if they are faced with different situations.

School lockdown procedures

Lockdown procedures may be activated in response to any number of situations, but some of the more typical might be:

- A reported incident / civil disturbance in the local community (with the potential to pose a risk to staff and pupils in the school).
- An intruder on the school site (with the potential to pose a risk to staff and pupils).
- A warning being received regarding a risk locally, of air pollution (smoke plume, gas cloud etc.).
- A major fire in the vicinity of the school.
- The close proximity of a dangerous dog roaming loose.

Lockdown drill

Our school will undertake a lockdown drill at least annually. The first one took place on 7/7/22. Pupils were made aware of the drill and the purpose of the drill beforehand.

In the event of any emergency situation, the school will obviously liaise immediately with the emergency services who will provide advice on the best course of action.
